Feedback needed on Draft Plans for Village Communities

As part of the 'Macleay Valley ~ Explore the Possibilities' consultation, Council held a series of community workshops throughout the Shire in late July/early August to find out from the community what living in the Macleay Valley could be like in 10 years time. From information gathered at these workshops Council has compiled draft Local Action Plans for each of the nine villages, focusing on community development in terms of services, public facilities and community goals. Pink & Blue Crosses at East Kempsey Cemetery - what do they mean?

Council recently placed dozens of pink crosses throughout the old monumental sections of East Kempsey Cemetery to mark vacant burial plots that are still available for single depth graves. Each position marked with a pink cross is available to be reserved.



If you are interested in reserving one of these sites all you need to do is contact Council and quote the names of the graves either of the cross to begin the process.

The cost to reserve a burial plot is \$315. This is a deposit which comes off the cost of the burial when it occurs.

Council has also placed blue crosses at East Kempsey Cemetery to mark burial sites reserved prior to 1967. Council needs members of the public, who believe they have reserved a plot prior to 1967, which is currently marked with a blue cross, to confirm their reservation with Council.

Flood Warning Terminology

After the May floods some members of the community expressed confusion about the terminology used for expected river heights.



Below are specific terms used by the Bureau of Meteorology (BOM) when a flood warning is issued:

Exceed – This is the term most likely to be used by the BOM in the developing stages of a flood. It is a forecast of a river height that is predicted to be exceeded, given the current rainfall that has been received in the catchment.

The use of this term does not consider any additional rainfall received after the issue of the warning. Logically any additional rainfall will result in an increase in the ultimate flood height.

Reach – This term is used when the BOM has considered the impact of up to 12 hours of future rainfall. This additional rainfall is assumed from rainfall prediction modelling. This provides the community with additional warning, although the actual rainfall intensity, spread and timing may differ from that predicted by the model.

If the rainfall is less than predicted, then the flood height may be lower or later. Conversely if the rainfall is greater than predicted the flood height may be higher.

Peak – This term is not used until the BOM are confident that the rainfall event is abating and the maximum flood height can be determined with certainty. This is generally late in the flood event after the rainfall event is either finished or is very close to being finished.

With the May 2009 flood event in Kempsey the BOM did not use the term Peak for Kempsey in their flood warnings until 3:23 am on 23 May 2009 at a flood peak of 7.0m, with all previous warnings using either the term Exceed or Reach.

Tree planting promotes environmental awareness with local students

To help celebrate Schools National Tree Day a group of enthusiastic school students and teachers from a number of primary and secondary schools across the Shire joined forces for a tree planting session at Riverside Park on 31 July. The day was an outstanding success with a total of 30 mixed native riverine seedlings along with approximately 20 native grass species planted.

The planting session also tied in with the innovative 'Human Sign Project' undertaken by the Macleay Educational Community of Schools (MECS), through which students delivered their favourite sustainability messages by forming their bodies into words, symbols and signs and having them photographed from a helicopter. The combined environmental benefit of the trees planted on Schools National Tree Day was calculated to be more than enough to offset the carbon emissions of the helicopter used to take the aerial photography.

The planting session was jointly coordinated by Council and MECS with assistance on the day from Macleay Landcare Network. Trees and grasses were supplied by Wigay Aboriginal Culture Park. It is proposed to mount a plaque next to the planting site so locals and visitors understand the link between the tree planting and the Human Sign Project.

Council reminds residents that, under the Local Government Act, dogs and other animals are prohibited from entering the Shire's Cemeteries. If your animal breaches this ordinance you may receive an on the spot fine of \$110 from Council Rangers.
