# **Annual Report** 2018-2019

Part A: Year in Review

### Mayor's Message

The 2018-19 year was one of transformation and transition as Council implemented the outcomes of the organisational and cultural review conducted in the preceding year.

The significant organisational restructure undertaken over the past year, led by our new Executive team, has built the solid foundations for Kempsey Shire Council to deliver the short and long-term objectives as set out in our Community Strategic Plan. Councillors, management and staff have been working with the community on our vision for reshaping the Macleay, and working towards a more efficient, customer-focused Council.

There are significant challenges in managing a finite budget against a growing list of services and more than \$1 billion of assets that need maintaining and upgrading. I commend the work underway and focus being driven by the Executive to improve our financial position.

Ongoing investment in our roads and bridges continues to strengthen our aged and large road network. Several transport network improvements, in both rural and urban areas, were completed around the Shire funded through Council and a combination of Federal and State Government assistance. This included rehabilitation of a section of Plummers Lane along the Macleay River, a key entry to South West Rocks; safety improvements along stretches of Armidale Road west of Turners Flat Road and east of Bellbrook; Belmore Street, Crescent Head and Bay Street, Hat Head; and work is underway to replace Turners Flat Bridge over the Macleay River.

Complementing this work was more than 2,500 metres of water and sewer mains relined or replaced; and the completion of projects, such

as the Gladstone Memorial Park upgrade, Jerseyville Wharf refurbishment and Grassy Head beach access enhancement.

With Council's ongoing drive to improve productivity and a safe working environment, staff participated in 6,680 hours of training and professional development, including tertiary sponsored studies. An important focus over the past year has been increasing the skills and knowledge of staff in management and supervisory positions.

Council continues to support strengthening our economy, aiming to build on the 540,000 visitors who came to the Shire over the past year and investigating new ways to generate development and jobs growth within the Macleay Valley. A grant from the Building Better Regions Fund assisted Council to establish a new Economic Development Committee and create an Economic Development and Tourism Strategy. Other key achievements were finalising the Kempsey Cinema Project VPA which will see the Kempsey Cinema open in late 2019 and undertaking a Strategic Options review for the future of the Kempsey Saleyards.

Our strategic capacity has been enhanced through the formation of our Mid North Coast Joint Organisation (MNCJO) collaboratively representing the communities of the Mid North Coast. We have worked with our JO partners on securing better funding, policy reform and key projects, including the Koala Recovery Strategy.

At a community level, Councillors and staff met with residents to discuss issues important to their local areas at the four Community Catch

Ups held throughout the year at Gladstone/ Smithtown, Willawarrin, Hat Head and Kundabung.

A variety of community events fostered connections, including Festival of Small Halls, Seniors Festival, Youth Week Events, NAIDOC Week and It's OK on the Macleay. At our annual Australia Day Awards, we recognised outstanding local individuals and community groups who give so much to enrich the lives of others, and we welcomed 30 new citizens into our national and local community at the three Citizenship Ceremonies held throughout the year.

I am proud to present this year's Annual Report. The strong performance achieved and significant progress made is a credit to the commitment of Council's management and staff, and of my fellow Councillors. I feel Council has built a strong foundation for the challenges we face, and we understand the responsibility we hold in delivering the best outcomes for the Macleay Valley community.
