Supply Chain Support grants

Eligible farmers can now apply for Supply Chain Support grants of between \$30,000 and \$100,000 to assist with storm and flood recovery tasks such as repairing damaged infrastructure, replacing lost livestock, and accessing vet or pest management advice.

Increase in harvestable rights for landholders in coastal-draining catchments

From early 2022, landholders in coastal-draining catchments of NSW will be able to capture up to 30% of the average regional rainwater runoff from their property in harvestable right dams built on nonpermanent minor streams, hillsides and gullies, with the remaining run-off flowing into licensed dams and the local river systems, where it is shared among all water users and the environment.

the fires. If eligible, a Strengthening Business facilitator will work with you to create and help implement a roadmap for your business going forward.

Fall Armyworm

Producers across NSW are being encouraged to regular monitor their crops, particularly maize and sorghum, for signs of fall armyworm.

Last season fall armyworm was found in all key summer cropping regions across the state and just this month there was a new detection at Croppa Creek in north west NSW.

Early signs of fall armyworm include crop damage, such as windowing and shot holes in leaves. If you think you've found the signs of fall armyworm, email images with your name, location, crop type and phone number to fallarmyworm@dpi.nsw.gov.au.
