COMMUNITY GRANTS

Congratulations to the 11 community organisations that were successful in the Bushfire Recovery Community Grants round. They are:

- Macleay Valley Landcare, awarded \$30,000 to develop and deliver community education workshops and seedling dispersal
- Macleay Valley Mountain Bikers, awarded \$30,000 for the development

of a professionally built track in Kalateenee State Forest

- Upper Macleay District Rodeo
 Association, awarded \$30,000 to
 implement new fencing for cattle yards
- Upper Macleay Soccer Club, awarded \$29,975 for oval upgrades
- Wittitrin Progress Association, awarded \$29,500 to lay a slab and connect power to a new community area

 Wittitrin Progress Association, awarded \$27,754 to erect a shed

- Bellbrook School of Arts, awarded \$23,400 to revitalise the Bellbrook tennis courts
- Temagog Rural Fire Service Brigade, awarded \$21,037 to install a radio repeater to enhance their communications
- Millbank Public Hall, awarded \$20,801 to deliver much needed upgrades to the Millbank Hall
- Hat Head Rural Service Fire Brigade, awarded \$5,500 to purchase a generator
- Temagog Rural Fire Service Brigade, awarded \$3,176 to purchase new IT equipment.

RECOGNITION FOR A LOCAL HERO

Much loved Shire resident Alice Strutt has been awarded the prestigious Australian Service Medal (NSW Rural Fire Service) by the Governor General.

Alice joined the NSW Rural Fire Service Temagog Brigade in 1981 in an era when it wasn't overly common for women to actively fight fires. In 1990 she was one of the first women on the coast to complete the basic firefighter training and later becoming a trainer herself.

Since that time, she has served in a range of roles including Deputy Captain in 1994 and Senior Deputy Captain in 1997. In 2008 she joined the Lower North Coast Communications Brigade and was Brigade Captain up until 2020. Alice is also a founding member of the Lower North Coast Aviation Brigade. It was her role in Communications that saw her deployed to many major fire events across the State. Alice has also assisted the SES with communications during times of flood. Additionally she has contributed to community engagement, assisting many of the smaller communities and schools in

smaller communities and schools in the upper Macleay region.

During the recent 2019 Black Summer Fires, Alice stayed on shift all night with the Communications Brigade as the Carrai East fire impacted the nearby Willawarrin community and surrounds. The following week the same



fire impacted the Temagog area, including Alice's own property.

Ms Strutt has provided exceptional dedication to the local community for over 39 years as an active member of the New South Wales Rural Fire Service, and she has proven to be an effective ambassador for all female firefighters. Congratulations Alice on this well-deserved accolade.

During the bushfires Keely was a front and centre volunteer in the

evacuation centre and went on to volunteer with Blaze Aid repairing fences on properties throughout the Shire.

As an RFS volunteer during the Black Summer Fires, Andrew Kirby protected the property of others through the night, then would barely make it home for a short sleep before working all day for his own business and repeating the process again for days on end. Michael Kemp was integral in providing support to his local Wittitrin community during the Black Summer Bushfires. Throughout 2020 Michael continued to support the community by donating funds, materials and labour to build shelters over donated caravans.
